## **Shifting landscape of unilateral trade and tariff preferences**

As the US announced sweeping tariffs targeting nearly all countries on 2 April 2025, with the US President Donald Trump making good on what he promised when he took office in January, it appears like the era of providing

trade preferences to countries deemed economically weaker is nearing its demise. The US, which was the flagbearer of the rules-based multilateral trading system, is now wrecking the system that ensured least developed countries (LDCs) were provided relatively easier trading terms to level the uneven playing field of international trade.

Through the Enabling Clause adopted in 1979 by the contracting parties to the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade (GATT), non-reciprocal trade preference schemes gained significance, aiming to integrate least developed countries (LDCs) into the global trading system. This led to various initiatives offering duty-free and quota-free (DFQF) market access to LDCs as well as providing a host of other forms of special and differential treatment. The tariff benefits were awarded based on the country's level of development—more importantly, differentiating between LDCs and non-LDC developing countries. For instance, the European Union's Generalized System of Preferences (GSP) has three tiers for granting tariff preferences—Everything but Arms (EBA) for LDCs, GSP+ for vulnerable developing nations, and the standard GSP for lower- middle-income countries. ## Pathway to better governance: Bangladesh White Paper

My aim, in this article, is not to repeat the multidimensional problems of Bangladesh enumerated in the white paper or recount solutions, reforms, and policies which are already mentioned in it. In fact, I have drawn my theme from certain recurring words from the paper: corruption, government, and bureaucrats/bureaucracy. First of all, the

white paper frequently finds faults with the latter two entities – now considered enemies of Bangladesh. Their collusion is blamed for misleading the people regarding Bangladesh's growth and progress. Second, a solution proposed in Section E of the paper that corresponds to Reforms and Policies, for instance, mentions good governance as a solution that addresses various political and economic factors of post-conquest Bangladesh. Since elected politicians and non-elected bureaucrats are two important factors that help practice good governance, it is clear, thus, that the writers implicitly believe that either their collusion or a respectful distance between them is indispensable for a reformed Bangladesh. I will, therefore, lay out the nature of the tension belonging to this paradoxical relationship through the help of multiple studies and enumerate the problems mentioned in the white paper that need maintenance where this relationship, or a lack thereof can be made useful. #### India, Pakistan trade now will come to complete halt

With Pakistan suspending all trade ties with India, including that routes through third countries, the two-way commerce will now come to a complete halt, apex exporters' body FIEO said. Following the terror attack in Pahalgam on 22 April, which killed 26 people, mostly tourists, India took a series of measures including immediate shutting down of the Attari land-transit post, used for movement of certain kinds of goods. #### **Donald Trump authorizes 90-day pause in tariffs on most countries except China**

US President Donald Trump has said he has authorised a 90-day pause in trade tariffs for most countries but has left China out of the new arrangement. #### Bangladesh halts yarn import through land ports

Bangladesh's National Board of Revenue has issued a gazette notification regarding the ban on the import of yarn and some other products through the country's land ports from India, Nepal and Bhutan, following repeated demands from local textile millers. Read more...
